CRISIS IN HAITI

Haiti continues to have civil unrest causing PID to shut down all team travel until further notice. Sandra, Abdias and Nora have been relocated to Mississippi while we wait to see our long term plan in Haiti. Meanwhile in Haiti, the staff is working hard to keep everything going. As local clinics and hospitals close due to local violence, our clinic population continues to expand. Since our clinic is off the beaten path, we are usually not affected. We are the only clinic still giving free medicine. On April 10 when I talked to the staff, they said there were hundreds of people outside the gate in the morning when they opened. When clinic staff decided to take in only sick children, over 70 extremely sick kids emerged from the crowd. Medicine is running low and we are contacting any one we can to see if they can help us. Normally teams carry down thousands of dollars worth of donated medicine and fund the purchase of additional medication and clinic costs.

To those who have sent extra funds for your sponsored child and their family, they send their love and gratitude as the cost of food has risen drastically, limiting access to food.

Our planned water filter project and housing project have been temporarily suspended .

We are so proud of our Haitian staff as they continue to work at making their country a better place- even in the face of this civil unrest.

WHAT'S UP

Our **CHILD SPONSORSHIP** has remained \$30 a month for almost 10 years. We have tried to keep it that way so that all levels of donors can afford it. Food and tuition continue to increase as well as uniforms, supplies, and medicine for our kids. In the last two months we have increased our cash disbursement to kids in Haiti because of the rising cost of food. This is not in our budget or your normal payment, so it has to come from our general fund, which is not very large. We made the difficult decision to raise sponsorship to \$35 a month or \$420 a year. **What does this mean to you as a donor?**

- 1. If you have already done an annual payment, don't worry, nothing will change until next time you need to pay.
- 2. If you can't afford the increase, don't worry, we will grand-father you in at your current level.
- 3. Thank you for your understanding and your kindness in donating to the extreme poor and increasing your donation when possible.

The cost of **TRIPS** remains at significantly lower prices than other organizations we have researched. As with sponsorship, we like to have our trips accessible to as many people as possible and not just those with more money. One of our goals is to not just provide services, but to open the eyes of the first world to what 3/4 of the rest of the world live like. Instead of increasing the price, it will remain at \$800 plus airfare but we will decrease the trip by one day. **Our trips will include the same services but will be 7 days and 6 nights**. WHAT'S NEW

- Many of you have traveled with PID in the past and continue to do so on a regular basis. We are always excited and happy to work with so many individuals and groups concerned about the extreme poor in the world. Much of the money that funds our clinics in all areas comes from trip fees. As you can imagine with the teams no longer traveling to Haiti we are having a serious short fall on medication and the future of the clinics being able to remain fully operational.
- We are asking that teams consider traveling to a new location during the Haiti shut down. We will continue to accept travelers to Haiti but ask that you list a second choice. Please contact trips pidonline.org before you plan your trip to Haiti so they can help with your second choice.
